So, you will see some sentences, as well as

So, let's start with some basic questions that people might ask about your work, your

8

job. For example, the most

basic one, if you have a job:

"Where do you work?"

10

Right? Where do you work? Do

you work at Microsoft, maybe?

11

Do you work at Google? Do

you work somewhere else?

12

And, this is a very common question, especially if you don't have, you know, like a set schedule

13

where you work, you can say: "Hey. When do you start?" Right? If you ask a person:

14

"When do you start? Do you start at

8 o'clock? 9 o'clock? 10 o'clock?"

15

00:01:01,023 --> 00:01:06,624

This might be a common question, you know, if you're wondering if you can have breakfast with someone

16

or maybe lunch with someone,

00:01:08,542 --> 00:01:12,820 depending on if they work in the afternoon, if they work in the morning,

18

00:01:12,844 --> 00:01:18,168 etc. And obviously, you can also ask

when a person finishes their job.

"When do you finish?" Okay?

Two other ways that we can ask when a person is finished are:

"Hey. When are you off?"

Okay? So, if you say: "When are you

off?" you know, you're asking them:

What time do you finish?

Same with this:

"When do you get off work?",

"When do you get off work?",

26

00:01:39,712 --> 00:01:41,946

"When do you finish

work?" All right?

So, again, you can say:

"When do you finish?",

"When are you off?", "When

do you get off work?"

Now, some sentences that we can use.

You can say:

"Oh, I work day shift.",

31

00:01:56,466 --> 00:02:00,417

"I work afternoon shift."

or "I work night shift."

Now, a shift is basically the time...

The period of time,

33

00:02:05,212 --> 00:02:11,990

the block of time of work that you do. So,

if you work in a factory, usually factories,

34

00:02:11,990 --> 00:02:18,514

a lot of them are open 24 hours per day. They have some people who work in the daytime,

35

00:02:18,538 --> 00:02:24,420

some people work in the afternoon, some people work at nighttime. So you can say:

00:02:24,576 --> 00:02:27,653

"Oh, I'm on day shift.",

37

00:02:27,735 --> 00:02:30,024

"I am on afternoon shift.",

38

00:02:30,218 --> 00:02:32,026

"I am on night shift."

39

00:02:32,316 --> 00:02:39,346

Instead of saying, you know: "I work day shift, afternoon shift, night shift", you can also say:

40

00:02:39,552 --> 00:02:43,539 "I'm on days.", "I'm on

afternoons.", "I'm on nights."

41

00:02:43,801 --> 00:02:47,310

And this can change, depending on how your schedule

42

00:02:47,310 --> 00:02:53,312

works. You can say: "I'm on afternoons this week, but next week I'm on days."

43

00:02:53,432 --> 00:02:54,219

And again,

44

00:02:54,219 --> 00:02:59,650

this is important information, depending on who you're talking to, if they want to get

45

00:02:59,650 --> 00:03:05,760

together with you for something, it's important to know. -"What shift are you on next week?"

46

00:03:05,784 --> 00:03:10,263

-"Next week I'm on nights, so that means that we can get together for dinner

47

00:03:10,310 --> 00:03:12,730

before I start work." Okay?

48

00:03:13,027 --> 00:03:22,765

Now, "overtime". "Overtime" is time that you work longer than you are expected to legally

work. So, for example, in most companies... I'm just going to talk about the North American

context. Typically, one week a person is expected to work in most jobs 40 hours per week. If

51

you work beyond that, you can work overtime.

Right? You work overtime. Or if you work eight

52

00:03:43,300 --> 00:03:50,150

hours per day, if you work more than eight

hours per day, you work overtime. So a person,

53

00:03:50,150 --> 00:03:53,058

your friends, colleague,

family member can ask you:

54

00:03:53,084 --> 00:03:55,533

"Hey. Are you doing

overtime tonight?"

55

00:03:55,558 --> 00:03:58,467

Or: "Are you working

overtime tonight?"

56

00:03:58,562 --> 00:04:02,370

And short form for

overtime: you can also say

57

00:04:02,370 --> 00:04:05,406

"OT". "Are you

doing OT tonight?"

58

00:04:05,538 --> 00:04:07,738

You can say: "Yeah,

I'm staying OT."

59

00:04:07,764 --> 00:04:11,842

Or: "I'm staying for two

hours of OT." for example.

60

00:04:12,170 --> 00:04:18,738

Okay, next: maybe a common sentence for

you, maybe not; depends on who you are.

61

00:04:18,872 --> 00:04:21,035

So, for example, here I wrote:

62

00:04:21,060 --> 00:04:24,449

"Jackie called in

sick last Friday."

63

00:04:24,536 --> 00:04:28,110

So if you are sick and you

call your job to tell them:

64

00:04:28,136 --> 00:04:33,906

"I'm sick. I can't come today."

you are calling in sick.

65

00:04:34,007 --> 00:04:40,110

So the phrase is "call in". Okay? You

might... Your friend might also tell you:

00:04:40,281 --> 00:04:44,776

"Hey. Monday, you know, we're going to have a big party on Sunday night,

67

00:04:44,843 --> 00:04:47,870

so Monday you're going to be very tired.

Just call in. Call in."

68

00:04:47,894 --> 00:04:50,584

Or: "Call in sick". Okay?

69

00:04:50,694 --> 00:04:54,050

I'm not recommending this, but

it's something people do.

70

00:04:54,389 --> 00:04:57,479

Next: "I need a vacation."

71

00:04:57,504 --> 00:05:02,447

And if you want to say you

have been working really hard,

72

00:05:02,471 --> 00:05:05,062

one expression you can use is:

73

00:05:05,088 --> 00:05:07,692

"I've been working

like a dog." Okay?

74

00:05:07,716 --> 00:05:09,314

You think of a dog like

75

00:05:09,339 --> 00:05:10,544

[pants like a dog]

76

00:05:10,829 --> 00:05:15,893

like this, if you are working

very hard, you can say:

77

00:05:15,918 --> 00:05:21,619

"I've been working like a dog." Another more slang-like expression that I'll put here,

78

00:05:21,644 --> 00:05:24,911 you can also say (cover

your ears, children):

79

00:05:25,036 --> 00:05:31,596

"I've been working my ass off."

80

00:05:33,776 --> 00:05:38,919

I'm sorry, my marker is not working very well here, but I'll do my best.

81

00:05:40,435 --> 00:05:43,989

So you can say: "I have

been working my ass off."

82

00:05:44,083 --> 00:05:47,482

Your ass or your butt. You

can say: "my butt off"

00:05:47,598 --> 00:05:51,067

if you want it to be a

little more polite. Okay?

84

00:05:51,334 --> 00:05:55,149

Because you're working so hard that

I guess your butt starts to sweat

85

00:05:55,149 --> 00:05:58,275

or it falls off, maybe.

I don't know.

86

00:05:59,077 --> 00:06:05,649

Another common phrase, you know, if you are at a job where you work part time, maybe you're

87

00:06:05,649 --> 00:06:12,198

a student, and maybe there are people with more experience, more seniority than you,

you could say: "I'm not

getting enough hours."

89

00:06:16,375 --> 00:06:19,959

This means my employer,

the person who gives

90

00:06:19,959 --> 00:06:26,404

me the job is not giving me enough work.

So I'm working 10 hours a week, that's it.

91

00:06:26,430 --> 00:06:33,370

I need minimum 15 hours, 20 hours, maybe you

want more hours than that to survive as a

92

00:06:33,370 --> 00:06:36,708

student or whatever

your life situation is.

00:06:36,826 --> 00:06:41,122
```

We'll move over here.

Another common phrase:

94

"Hey. Can you come in early?"

95

00:06:43,702 --> 00:06:48,293

This might be your boss asking

you: "Can you come in early?"

96

00:06:48,372 --> 00:06:52,210

If you come in early,

you come in before your

97

00:06:52,209 --> 00:06:55,820

job is scheduled to start. Okay?

98

00:06:56,218 --> 00:07:01,158

And another way to say: "I

worked overtime", you can say:

00:07:01,182 --> 00:07:04,706

"Last night, I had

to stay late."

100

00:07:04,732 --> 00:07:08,710

So maybe, you know, you are

an employee, you work at

101

00:07:08,709 --> 00:07:14,230

a job where you can't finish everything

in your eight hours, or nine hours,

102

00:07:14,255 --> 00:07:20,380

or whatever you work, and you have to stay

later, later - you can tell your friends:

103

00:07:20,406 --> 00:07:22,834

"I had to stay late last night."

00:07:22,860 --> 00:07:27,579

Or you tell them today: "Sorry,

I can't come dancing", or:

105

00:07:27,603 --> 00:07:33,906

"I can't go to the movie. I have to stay

late. I have to work more at my job."

106

00:07:33,930 --> 00:07:37,096

And again, talking

about vacation:

107

00:07:37,120 --> 00:07:40,435

"Have you had any

time off this year?"

108

00:07:40,576 --> 00:07:42,317

So, you can say:

109

00:07:42,363 --> 00:07:44,312

"I need some time off."

00:07:44,312 --> 00:07:48,536

Time off is time away from work;

you're not really working. Right?

111

00:07:48,560 --> 00:07:52,899

You're taking a vacation,

paid, usually. I hope.

112

00:07:53,158 --> 00:07:56,947

And finally: "She took

a day off yesterday."

113

00:07:57,024 --> 00:08:00,930

We talked about taking a

sick day, being sick.

114

00:08:01,119 --> 00:08:07,080

You can also take a day off because you have a personal emergency, or you have a schedule

115

00:08:07,105 --> 00:08:12,306

with a doctor, or something like that.

You can take a day off.

116

All right, so a lot

of vocabulary here.
