he works / she lives / it rains etc.

- I work in a shop. My brother works in a bank. (not My brother work)
- Lucy lives in London. Her parents live in Scotland.
- It rains a lot in winter.

Joe has a shower every day.

 - We **do** a lot of different things in our free time.
 - It costs a lot of money to build a hospital.
- **always/never/often/usually/sometimes** + present simple
 - O Sue **always gets** to work early. (*not* Sue gets always)
 - I never eat breakfast. (not I eat never)
 - We **often go** away at weekends.
 - Mark usually plays football on Sundays.
 - O I **sometimes walk** to work, but not very often.
